

CALIFORNIA STATE ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES

AUTHORITY

Founded in 1895; reorganized on May 5, 1911; incorporated as a non-profit corporation on February 26, 1945.

Name changed from County Supervisors Association of California at the CSAC annual meeting in November, 1991.

NUMBER OF MEMBERS

Not less than 58 nor more than 62, consisting of the President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President and Immediate Past President of the Association, and one elected director from each County Board of Supervisors maintaining the membership of its supervisors in the Association.

APPOINTMENT

Each director shall be a member of the county board and shall be elected by the board, pursuant to its normal rules and procedures, prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association, to serve for a one-year term commencing with the Annual Meeting.

DUTIES

Powers of Board of Directors

Subject to the provisions of the California Nonprofit Corporation Law and any limitations in the Articles of Incorporation and the CSAC Constitution relating to actions of the general membership, the activities and affairs of the Association shall be conducted, and all of its corporate powers shall be exercised, by or under the direction of the Board of Directors. The Board may delegate the management of the activities and affairs of the Association to any person or persons, or to any committee, however composed, provided that such activities and affairs shall be managed and all corporate powers shall be exercised under the ultimate direction of the Board.

Purpose and Objective of Association

- a. Perform research and develop policy on issues of concern to county government.
- b. Represent county government before the State Legislature and the Congress, and before the executive branches and administrative agencies of both State and Federal governments.
- c. Gather and report to counties, information on legislative, executive and administrative actions at the State and Federal levels.
- d. Assist counties in implementing new laws and regulations.
- e. Provide educational, training and information exchange programs on subjects of county interest.
- f. Provide or coordinate joint insurance and other joint service programs for counties.
- g. Arrange and conduct meetings for the transaction of Association business, and to promote county communication and coordination in areas of common concern.
- h. Perform related and additional functions as directed by the governing bodies of the Association.
